READING

Reading is vital to children's life chances.

Children are expected to read regularly at home – a variety of genres including fiction, non-fiction and poetry.

Reading is also strangely improves mental maths.

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

- Results are sent to schools sometime in July.
- Reading, Maths and Grammar will report a raw score, a scaled score and a judgement of whether the national standard has been met.
- Writing will only report a judgement of whether the national standard has been met.
- Reading, Maths and Grammar do not report working above the national standard.
- SATS assess learning from Year 3, Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

- Each raw score is converted into a scaled score of between 80 and 120.
- A scaled score of 100 or more is meeting the national standard.
- A scaled score generally of 110 may indicate that a child is working above the national standard.
- DO NOT USE PAST PAPERS WITH CHILDREN AT HOME TO PRACTISE

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

- Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling Paper 1 focuses on:
- Grammatical terms/word classes;
- Functions of sentences;
- Combining words, phrases and clauses;
- Verb forms, tenses and consistency;
- Punctuation;
- Vocabulary;
- Standard English and formality.

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling Paper 1 requires a range of answer types such as circling missing capital letters, multiple choice questions, one-word answers - correct spelling.

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

Reading paper focuses on

3 different set texts - a combination of non-fiction, fiction and poetry.

2a) give/explain the meaning of words in context;

2b) retrieve and record information/identify key details from fiction and non-fiction;

2c) summarise main ideas from more than one paragraph;

2d) make inferences from the text/explain and justify inferences with evidence from the text;

2e) predict what might happen from details stated and implied;

2f) identify/explain how information/content is related and contributes to meaning as a whole;

2g) identify/explain how meaning is enhanced through choice of words and phrases;

2h) make comparisons within the text.

The reading paper has a range of answering styles including responding to multiple choice questions, one word answers, formal paragraph length answers.

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

END OF KEY STAGE 2 ASSESSMENTS - SATS

- Maths Paper 2 and 3 - Reasoning.
- 40 minutes worth 35 marks each.
- The questions increase in difficulty throughout the paper.
- Questions focus on:
 - Number and place value - including Roman Numerals.
 - Addition, subtraction, multiplication and division
 - Geometry - properties of shape
 - Geometry - position and direction
 - Statistics
 - Measurement - length, perimeter, area, mass, volume, time, money
 - Algebra
 - Ratio and proportion
 - Fractions, decimals and percentages

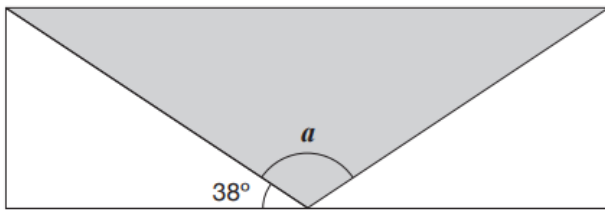

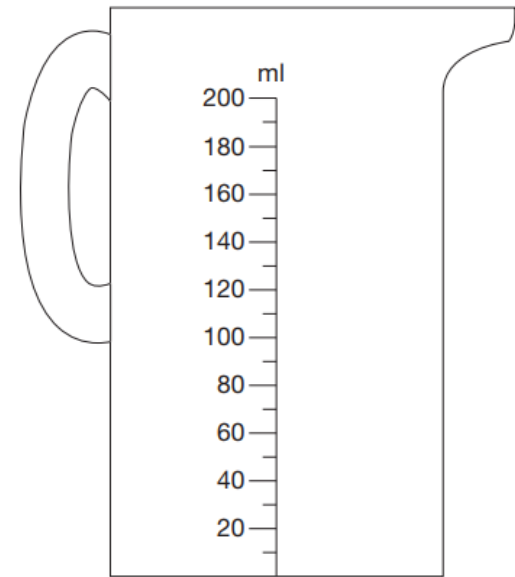

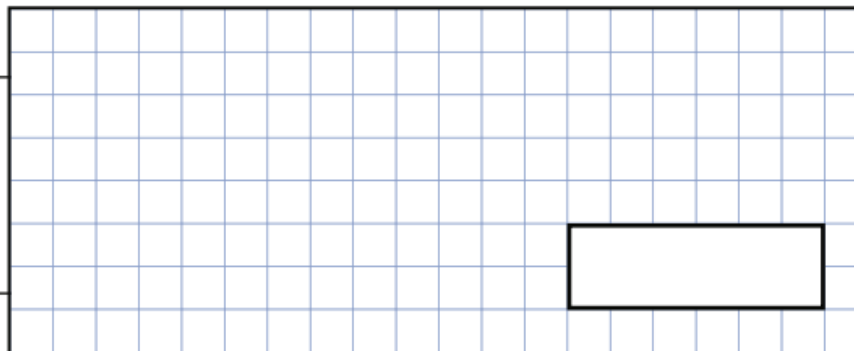

REMEMBER THIS THOUGH

- **SATS** focus on what children know about Maths and English
- They won't reflect how talented they are at Science, Geography, Art or PE, and they certainly won't highlight positive personal characteristics such as kindness and integrity.

REMEMBER THIS THOUGH

- SATs results don't always tell the whole story!
- The results will say they DID or DIDN'T meet a certain standard, but not necessarily by what margin. Additionally, the thresholds tend to change each year according to overall national performance, so what was classed as 'did meet the expected standard' in 2023 may have been considered a 'did not' in 2012.

REMEMBER THIS THOUGH

- **SATS last for one week**
- In reality, it's just one or two papers lasting 30-60 minutes each day. You can't emphasise enough the importance of keeping that in perspective.
